Spring 2024 Update on Lehigh Crossing Park Project

This is our second spring working at Lehigh Crossing Park. The Pond at Lehigh is the focus of a special project of Victor Hiking Trails working closely with Victor Parks & Rec. We began last year by installing some nest boxes for birds close to the pond (a family of Tree Swallows took up residence of one within a few weeks) and adding some logs to the pond to give more basking spaces for the Painted Turtles (I counted 30 of all sizes early this spring on a sunny day) that live in and nearby the pond. We took a closer look, focused on small areas at a time, had fun and felt a sense of accomplishment. Additional work parties were scheduled to tackle the daunting task of at least creating an opening in front of the bench that was looking at a 12 foot high wall of invasive grass called Common Reed or Phragmites. We also targeted some large Autumn Olive shrubs, Multiflora Rose, and non-native Honeysuckle shrubs. We knew this would not be permanent without frequent re-visits, and the pond kept beckoning us to return.

A year later, Spring 2024, both nest boxes alongside the pond are occupied by Tree Swallows. The Phragmites in the areas of our intensive work are returning, but definitely are subdued. The native sedges have outdone themselves this spring, something I barely noticed last year under the cover of Phragmites. Shrubs that we added early last summer, mostly Button Bush and Common Ninebark, native flowering shrubs that love having wet feet, are holding their own, probably too young to bloom this year, but perhaps next year? A small patch of Common Milkweed near the pond has emerged, along with the return of Swamp Milkweed and Butterfly Weed (all essential for the charismatic Monarch Butterfly). I find the scent of the flower of the Common Milkweed to be intoxicating, a scent that is one of the ways invertebrates find their way to such plants. This is the perfect area for a waystation where Monarchs should be passing through from July into fall, if we can encourage the milkweeds to flourish.

All hikes meet at Victor Town Hall rear parking lot, 85 East Main Street, at 9:00 AM unless otherwise noted. Most hikes are relatively easy and take 2-3 hours. Always bring a snack and something to drink. Dress for the weather. We rarely cancel due to inclement weather.

As noted in our schedule there are several educational hikes planned for 2024. These are usually on a Sunday afternoon, starting at 2:00 PM.

We usually carpool from Victor Town Hall to the trailhead. Expect to share the cost of gas with the driver. If you have any questions regarding any of the hikes, or if you have suggestions for places to hike, please leave a message at the VHT Message Line, 585-234-8226.

Again this year we have scheduled several hikes in Victor or the surrounding communities. We are also leading shorter and easier hikes to encourage families and younger hikers to join us. Wednesday morning we meet at the Victor Farmington Library at 9:00 AM for a short, easy walk.

Additional hikes with the Victor PTSA may be scheduled throughout the year.

We only hike as fast as the slowest hikers, so don't worry about not keeping up. If we need to split into more than one group, that is not a problem. **Come enjoy the fun.**

NOTE: There are several hiking Meetup groups in our area that schedule hikes in Victor. If you like to hike, join those Meetup groups as well.

Past Hikes

Apr 13— Ganondagan State Historic Site. We are a special breed that hikes in all kinds of weather, be it hot and humid, cold and rainy, frozen and windy, or pleasant with a cool breeze. But apparently, not everyone wants to hike in a downpour. So when the two hike leaders were the only ones who showed up, they decided to go to breakfast. No photos were taken.

May 11— Mertensia Park, Bluebells. This was an early Spring and an easy winter, so we almost missed the bluebells. There were still plenty along the creek, but they were definitely past their peak. Most of the group hiked about 2.5 miles while two went about 6 miles.



Jun 1— National Trails Day. Attendance was lower that past years because many groups like us in our region were also celebrating trails. We had more volunteers than people who signed up to hike. So most of the volunteers went on one of three hikes. Barb Starr led a bird watching hike around the fields between the Lehigh Valley Trail and Fishers park. Dave Wright led a group on the Lehigh Valley Trail, through Fishers Park, on a short section of the Auburn Trail, through the Domine property and back on the Lehigh Valley Trail for 3.4 miles. Chauncy led the fast-paced, longer hike covering about 5 miles in 90 minutes. Everyone enjoyed the



pizza and drinks for lunch and then a few hiked or drove to Lehigh Crossing Park to see the work that Barb Starr and volunteers have accomplished.

Jun 8—ADK Outdoor Expo. Another great day meeting people who like to hike and telling them about the trails in Victor. The wind was blowing all day, but that didn't deter the hikers that followed Chauncy up and down the hills at Mendon Ponds Park.

Educational Hikes

Mar 24— Oxbow and Harts Woods, Perinton Thank you to Perinton town historian, Bill Poray for leading the group on a very interesting hike, learning the history of the Oxbow community that spent their summers in cabins on the canal in Fairport. We also learned about the history of hart's Woods and hiked on the

trails.





Apr 27—Invasive Species (Naples)

A small group of folks interested in learning how to identify invasive plants and why they are harmful to our region listened to retired FLCC professor Dr. Bruce Gilman as they walked along Naples Creek. Thank you Bruce for sharing your knowledge with VHT members.



May 26—Bird Watching at Washington Grove The guide, Patti Pirz – co-owner of "The Bird House" (Monroe Ave.), talked about, and helped identify wild birds, and more. It was prime nesting season, so many members brought their binoculars to help identify the birds.



Trail Maintenance and Projects

Our regular trail maintenance is in full swing with mowing, hedge trimming, painting the blazes and getting the lower weeds with the string trimmer.

One major project recently was a temporary reroute of the section of the Seneca Trail south of County Road 41. A colony of beavers decided that Great Brook would make a wonderful pond, just north of our truss bridge. They flooded the trail on the west side of the creek, making it impossible to follow the trail with a good pair of hip boots.

A call to action was made and in less than two days a new trail was cut and a tempo-

rary bridge was built upstream so hikers and bikers can enjoy the trail and maybe see a beaver at work. Thank you to volunteers from GROC, TrailsRoc and VHT.




New temporary bridge.

The long range solution is an elevated boardwalk from the bridge to higher ground. Life Scout Logan Springer and Troop 61 will take on the project as soon as all of the paperwork is signed. I am seeing some other butterflies that I did not see last year. We protected an area where a plant called Pussytoes, a host plant for the American Lady Butterfly, ekes out its existence in a sunbaked, rocky, thin substrate where little else will grow but those tenacious plants that have adapted to the terrain. They will continue to return each year if we don't mow them down on a weekly basis. A few weeks ago, I was able to capture a photo of one of the American Lady Butterflies who was visiting the Pussytoes. My hope is that they were attaching some eggs to the silvery, velvety



leaves. Last week, I photographed a Little Wood Satyr Butterfly in the open field. Multiple species of Dragonflies and Damselflies are back patrolling the pond. Northern Leopard Frogs called out for a few weeks in early spring, followed by Bullfrogs (they are native to our area), and Green Frogs. That distinctive "plop-splash" you hear is one of the many frogs jumping into the water just before you get a chance to take a good look. And if you stand at the edge of the pond, you can clearly see Bluegills (fish) come to see what you might offer to them. A great place to bring budding young girls and boys to learn to fish.

Our most ambitious work party this year took place 4/27/24. Much preparation went into this project of adding 28 1-2 year old native shrubs purchased by Parks & Rec from Ontario County Soil & Water, a very cost effective way of purchasing plants. Starting with small plants is recommended as preferable to getting larger specimens that require more care and input, not to mention a much higher price tag. Having volunteers to plant is an additional bonus. We were fortunate to have 6 very capable VHS Key Club members with 6 very capable adults, to dig the holes, and plant our shrubs. Sites on either side of the blue picnic table were chosen for half the plants, and another 14 were planted above the pond in a small wooded area that we had cleared earlier this spring. The clearing revealed a stand of Gray Dogwood, Nannyberry, Black Cherry, various violets, American Tree Moss, Sensitive Fern and several other native plants valuable to wildlife. Adding Elderberry, Flowering White Dogwood, American Hazelnut, Red Osier Dogwood and a few others should help make an area suitable for demonstration of how these natives enhance the surroundings and are perhaps even suitable to landscapes around our homes.

Small triumphs, but so worth the effort. VHT volunteers and nearby neighbors have attended work parties since spring 2023. Most months have had at least 3 parties, sometimes with only 2 volunteers, but often with 4 or 5. The parties generally last less than 2 hours on weekday mornings or afternoons. Several volunteers have returned multiple times. Few things in life are more valuable than our hands-on time spent in a worthwhile endeavor, and I believe few things are more rewarding. Come join us as we continue to work on keeping Phragmites in check, enhancing the area for the growth of wonderful native plants that the lives of all the wildlife at Lehigh Crossing Park depend upon. Ultimately, we all depend on this web of life, but that is another long story. The rewards for such work, the peace one feels in the quiet (we primarily work with hand tools), the wonder of all you see with a close-up look (we take time to stop to see a fluttering butterfly or a gliding Heron), the camaraderie you experience with others who care (we do carry on some conversations, especially when we are done), are incalculable.

Wednesday Library Walkers

This group continues to grow. There are some regulars that attend every week and there are some new faces that heard that we are a fun, friendly, easy going group.

If you like short (2-3 miles), easy paced (25 to 30 minutes per mile) easy (mostly flat with a few slopes occasionally) hikes, this is for you.

Come to the Victor Farmington Library (VFL) at 9:00 AM on Wednesday and join the group. If it's raining or cold, dress for the weather.



After the hike you can have a beverage or some nourishment at a local restaurant and get to know the other hikers.

VHT Dues
